How was missions?

Three weeks of missions was simultaneously so long for a shortterm mission trip but also so short to say that it was for the sole purpose of relational evangelism. During these three weeks of approaching students and forming relationships with them, I quickly realized that **it was impossible for me to see which students would respond well to the Gospel or which friendships would continue to bloom** so that I could naturally share the Gospel and how it has changed my life.

I would have great spiritual conversations and share the Gospel and my testimony with them just to have them tell me that they were no longer interested in coming out to any of our events or even meeting up with me for lunch on campus. On the other hand, I also had students who initially didn't really want to talk to me or seemed hesitant to get to know me, but over several opportunities, got to hear the Gospel multiple times and came to receive Christ and get connected with the local ministry.

These interactions really taught me to rely on the Holy Spirit and to not place my expectations in the signs that I could see, but to place my expectations in the fact that I could rely on God to be moving through me whether it looked fruitful or not.

I also realized that this type of evangelism—forming relationships, becoming personal, and then sharing the God that is so personal to mewas something I could bring back to my life in the states and honestly would be so much easier to do without the language barrier anyways. Every time I reflected how doing ministry on the mission field was, I was reminded and convicted of my team at work back in the States that didn't know Christ. I gained a new understanding of what it meant to be called into the workforce and consider my work my primary mission field, because this was the type of ministry that I was called to with my coworkers.

In a way, I felt like evangelism on the mission field was so much easier than evangelism back at home because I had a team keeping me accountable for reading the Bible, worshiping, and continuing to rely on God, and my supporters praying over me. I was afraid of coming back because I would have additional responsibilities of work and without the consistent community to continually keep me accountable.

However, this is the challenge that I face, and given this conviction, I'm also excited to see how God will continue to move in me and through me back in normal life as well :)
